A Service of Thanksgiving for the Life of Professor John Beverley Knight (12 January 1939 – 17 January 2024)

The Chapel, St Edmund Hall Saturday, 26 October 2024, 2PM

Welcome to the Chapel and to this memorial service. We remember today, Professor John Beverley Knight, and give thanks for his life and service to the College and University.

The first documented reference to St Edmund Hall is from 1317, which indicates an earlier foundation. Although Oxford's oldest colleges date to the mid-thirteenth century, it was not until the sixteenth century that the colleges commonly admitted undergraduates. St Edmund Hall, therefore, has a claim to be the oldest surviving academic society in Europe to house and educate undergraduates. It continues to provide an inspiring home for our students today.

Professor Knight was a Tutorial Fellow in Economics for 39 years, from 1967 to 2006. He was hugely respected by colleagues, students and staff alike as an academic, teacher and leader. During his time on Governing Body, he took on a number of key roles including Finance Bursar and Vice Principal. Professor Knight also initiated the Oxford Chinese Economy Programme (OXCEP) at the Hall. In the Economics department, he was their first Head of Department in 2000 having previously been the Director of the Institute of Economics and Statistics.

An internationally acclaimed academic in development economics, he published five books, numerous book chapters and over 100 journal articles as well as serving as editor of leading journals during his distinguished career.

Following his retirement, he held visiting professorships at Peking University and Beijing Normal University in recognition of his ongoing research in crucial areas of the Chinese economy, including labour markets and inequality. Reflecting his longstanding interest in Africa, Professor Knight was a co-founder of the Centre for the Study of African Economies (CSAE) in the Department of Economics. He will be remembered as a dedicated colleague and friend, and champion of the Hall, by many students and staff.
